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
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What is Shibuya?

Shibuya is the most exciting city in Japan. Some even say that "you haven't truly visited Tokyo until you've been to Shibuya." Its major facilities are located around Shibuya Station, within a 10-minute walk.

Since this is a city that symbolizes youth culture and fashion, and the birthplace of trends, businesses started to gather there and gave it the name Bit Valley as it became an area for developing IT businesses. Overlooking Shibuya from Hachiko Square, you can see the Scramble



Access to Shibuya

Shibuya is located in the southwest part of central Tokyo.

Access to Shibuya once entering Japan is very simple.

Airport shuttle buses run directly there from Haneda Airport and Narita Airport.

This is a highly convenient means of transportation with frequent service, taking just 40 minutes from Haneda and 90 minutes from Narita.

Shibuya Station is a terminal station that ranked third in the world for number of passengers, with connections to eight train lines.

Harajuku, Shinjuku, and Roppongi (with a transfer) can be reached within 10 minutes, and Asakusa, Tokyo Skytree, and Yokohama within 30 minutes without changing trains. Shibuya could be called Tokyo's greatest location for sightseeing.






The Captivating City of Shibuya



Shibuya is the #1 City in Tokyo, with the Most Visitors

According to a questionnaire of foreign visitors upon their departure from Japan, Shibuya was the city with the most visitors. The responses, by nationality, show that the majority of people in the survey who were from France, Spain, Italy, and Australia visited Shibuya.

The Statue of Hachiko: The Dog Who Waited Faithfully for His Master



The Statue of Hachiko is a bronze statue of an Akita dog located in Shibuya Station Square, and serves as Japan's most famous meeting point.

Hachiko faithfully awaited his owner's return by going to Shibuya Station everyday for seven years, not knowing his owner had passed away, which touched people's hearts.

The story was adapted as a movie, *Hachi: A Dog's Tale*, in 2009, starring Richard Tiffany Gere and directed by Lasse Hallström.

Scramble Crossing


Scramble Crossing in front of Shibuya Station packed with vast numbers of pedestrians is famous worldwide.


Shibuya's Scramble Crossing is Japan's most famous intersection, well-known in television and other media. Up to around 3,000 people cross the intersection every time the traffic stops and the walk lights change. Pedestrians all converge at the same time as people heading to the station and down major streets intersect, creating a flood of humanity, imbuing the city with liveliness and accompanied by multiple large-scale display screens.




Numerous Display Screens Light Up Shibuya, Like Something from a Sci-Fi Movie




Shibuya, City of Fashion


Tokyo is a world-leading fashion city and of all the sectors of Tokyo, Shibuya is the city with the most fashion influence. Since the 1970s, it has established an equal status with Harajuku as a fashion capital with the advancement of PARCO, MARUI, and the birth of SHIBUYA109. In the 1990s, it gained greater attention as an information source due to the media's frequent coverage of the *gyaru* (gal) trend. *Gyaruo* fashion, the male counterpart of *gyaru*, and the fashion called onii-kei

History of Shibuya: Trendsetting District in Youth Fashion

In 1968, the Seibu department store expanded to Shibuya and in 1973, PARCO opened. Their presence led the city earned the status of a trend-setting district of youth culture and a mecca of fashion and trends. In the 1990s, the *gyaru* trend began. Media coverage of these movements brought attention to Shibuya not only for being the fashion capital but also as a source of information and trends.












Commercial Facilities in Shibuya

Above all, the fashion suggested by "charismatic salesclerks," who are enormously popular among fashion-oriented customers, attracts the attention of young people.

Shibuya Hikarie

Shibuya Hikarie is a multistory complex consisting of 34 floors above ground and four below ground, located out the East Exit of Shibuya Station, one of Japan's most prominent terminal stations, with connections to eight train lines. Shibuya Hikarie holds a 2,000-seat full-scale musical theater, 1,000 m² and 300 m² event halls perfect for various informational events, and a "creative space" where gifted artists can express their talents, in the cultural facility located in the middle area.





Among those, there are approximately 200 stores housed in ShinQs, a sophisticated commercial facility managed by Tokyu Department Store that covers floors from B3 to 5F. This is an area where one can always make new discoveries.

More than 70% of these stores established their first store in Shibuya.

It is a completely new shopping area that provides the future of shopping where one can independently and freely explore the sales floors, discover, combine, and enjoy the experience.

Unexpected encounters, new discoveries, and excitement are proof that this facility has more to offer than just a shopping experience.






The City That Transmits Cutting-edge Culture



■ Number of Movie Theaters in 9 major cities (2012)






Number of Clubs and Discos (2012)

Besides music performances, it is also utilized for events such as corporate conventions and wedding parties.



<u>Hikarie Hall</u> An Event Hall—A Large-Scale Indoor Space

The high-performance hall, with ceiling height of 7 meters, holds events such as fashion shows, exhibitions, and plays the role of information source.



Bunkamura A Complex Cultural Facility that Creates a New Future Through Various Cultures

This was Japan's first large-scale complex cultural facility, opened in 1989.

Facilities such as the concert hall (music), theatre (plays), museum (art), and a mini-theater (movies) are installed with three concepts in mind: Place of Presentation, which creates and offers high-quality culture, Place of Creation, which develops new culture, and Place of Encounters, which promotes interaction of people, art, and things. There are also cafes and art-related shops.

Bunkamura Orchard Hall One of the World's Greatest Halls for Concert, Opera, and Ballet

This is Japan's largest shoebox-style hall. The refraction from the sound reflects repeatedly on the high, flat ceiling (20 meters high) and the large, vertical side wall, producing rich, thick acoustics. Its most striking feature is the giant movable tripartite acoustic shelter. Moving this shelter enables the hall to function as a theatre as well as a concert hall. It can offer performances of such diverse genres as classical music (main), opera, and ballet, as well as popular music concerts.

Shibuya, Bit Valley, Where Cutting-edge IT


Shibuya came to be known as the Bit Valley, short for "bitter valley," a play on the words of the literal translation of Shibuya (*shibui*, of Shibuya, means "bitter", and *tani*, the second *kanji* in Shibuya, meaning "valley"), as well as the computer term, bit, due to the increased concentration of internet-related business ventures in the area since the late 1990s.

The City Where Cutting-Edge Companies Gather

Shibuya has been ranked #1 in number of shared offices by municipality nationwide (by ward), with 37.

The number of business offices for services associated with the internet is 120, the highest in the targeted comparison region, and increased by 110 during 2001-2009.

■ Number of Business Offices for Services Associated with Internet in 9 Major Cities (2009)





Brilliant Ideas. A New Horizon. Fascinating People Gather. TEDxTokyo

This is a community that is being grown around the world to share the spirit of TED, "ideas worth spreading." TEDxTokyo was the first international TEDx and one of the first two TEDxes overall, playing one of the leading roles in the development of this global movement from the time when TEDx was simply an idea.

TEDxTokyo was initially held at the National Museum of Emerging Science and Innovation in Odaiba, Tokyo starting in 2009, and in 2012 moved to its new home in Shibuya Hikarie, expanding its own unique community.

It is the Japanese version of the TEDx conference, where entrepreneurs, scholars, engineers, artists, ecologists, and other diverse individuals gather to share and explore ideas and possibilities.

Starting with the opening of Shibuya Hikarie in 2012, progress is being made in the large-scale redevelopment of Shibuya, with the aim of becoming an international city of tourism and culture, where a diversified lifestyle and culture can be found and presented to the world.




Image of Completed Redevelopment around Shibuya Station

1. Station Block

A New Landmark that Transforms the View of Shibuya is Born



The Station Block will have three buildings adjacent to Shibuya Station.

As the largest scale buildings for offices and commercial facilities in the district around the station, the East Building will open by 2020 and the Center Building and the West Building will open in 2027.

Among them, the East Building, with a height of 230 meters, higher than Shibuya Hikarie, will no doubt become the new landmark of Shibuya.

Watch for the reborn Shibuya, where you can move around the station freely with the expanded path that connects the east and west station squares.

By updating the function and reorganizing Shibuya Station, and reorganizing the urban infrastructure and city blocks integrally with redevelopment of the station buildings, Shibuya will become a charming city that has achieved further development and evolution.

2. South Block

A Creative Area for Experiencing Memories of History and Nature



The 34-floor above ground and 4-floor below ground building to be constructed on the former site of the platform and the railroad track of the old Toyoko Line Shibuya Station will contain a hotel in the middle level and a hall and commercial facilities in the lower level, and is scheduled to open in 2018. The goal in its placement is to make the area along the Shibuya River a place of liveliness, with a green promenade and a riverfront area. The overpass of the old Toyoko line will be repurposed as a pedestrian deck, adding a touch to this creative area so you can feel the life of history and nature in a modern atmosphere.

3. Dogenzaka Block

Shibuya's New Gateway for the Home of Urban Tourism



A 17-floor above ground and 5-floor below ground building is scheduled to be constructed around the present Tokyu Plaza Shibuya in the Dogenzaka Block. There will be a bus terminal that includes a station for the airport shuttle bus on the ground floor, a commercial facility on the mid-to-lower levels, and high-grade offices on the upper levels. There will also be a tourist support facility that will make the area the home of urban tourism. A common phrase about Shibuya after this area's opening in 2018 may be, "If you want to hang out in Shibuya, why not start with Dogenzaka?"

4. Sakuragaoka Entrance Block



A Complex that Represents Shibuya, the Cosmopolitan City

Adjacent to Shibuya Station, buildings with a total floor area of approximately 241,400 m^2 , that include offices, businesses, and residences, are scheduled to be constructed. Livelihood support facilities for the residents and foreign businesspeople, and entrepreneurship support facilities to help create ties within the creative content industry, will be installed.

With the improvement of the entrance of the Sakuragaoka block that extends across the southwest region of Shibuya Station, Shibuya will likely become a city with a strengthened spirit of *omotenashi* (hospitality).

Free Wi-Fi Service for Foreign Travelers

A survey conducted by the Japan Tourism Agency in 2011 found that the issue foreign tourists had the most trouble with while travelling was the lack of free Wi-Fi. Accordingly, the free Wi-Fi service called Visit SHIBUYA Wi-Fi was started with the aim of promoting the increase and excursions of visitors by offering a free Wi-Fi environment to help extend the range of their activities, such as obtaining information about the Shibuya and sharing their experiences on social networking services.

Visit SHIBUYA Wi-Fi, Free Wi-Fi Service for Foreign Travelers

This service is available at the station and at commercial facilities surrounding the station, including Tokyu and Tokyo Metro Shibuya Stations (excluding some areas), Shibuya Hikarie, Tokyu Department Store Honten, Toyoko Store, and SHIBUYA109.

The first screen after logging in will provide information on the larger Shibuya area as well as the Tokyu Group, providing travelers with an informational background to freely enjoy Shibuya.



<u>Meiji Shrine</u>

Tokyo's #1 Green Power Spot

This shrine was built in 1920 in dedication to Emperor Meiji and Empress Shoken.

It is located in a manmade forest consisting of approximately 100,000 trees donated from all parts of Japan. The trees now grow thickly like a natural forest, nurturing a rich variety of life such as rare plants, insects, and wild birds.

Despite its urban location, it is filled with serenity and solemnity.

There is an Iris garden inside the Gyoen, the imperial garden associated with the enshrined deities, and beautiful irises are in full bloom in June. In the back is a spring, which is a valuable source of water for the iris garden, called Kiyomasa's well. It is said to have been dug by Kato Kiyomasa.

Meiji Shrine will mark the 100th anniversary of its enshrinement in 2020, the year in which the Tokyo Olympics will be held.



Omotesando Japan's Fanciest Tree-Lined Avenue


This street was originally created as the front approach to Meiji Shrine. The area is known as a shopping street, featuring a multitude of top name international and Japanese brand stores, especially along Omotesando-dori. The large-scale commercial facilities Omotesando Hills and Tokyu Plaza Omotesando Harajuku opened respectively in 2006 and 2012. The backstreets house a quiet residential area scattered with up-and-coming select stores and beauty salons, making it popular among young people.

Nakameguro A Stylish Spot to View Cherry Blossoms

The Meguro River runs parallel to Yamate-dori. Cherry trees are planted along the river, especially in the area from Nakameguro to Ikejiri-ohashi Station, making the area a lively spot with many people during the cherry blossom season.

In recent years, the number of stores along the river that sell fashion and miscellaneous goods has increased.





<u>Ebisu</u>

The Fusion of Gourmet Food and Fashion

The name Ebisu is derived from Yebisu beer. With Sapporo Breweries Limited being headquartered in the area, the names of areas such as Sapporo Beer Square and Beer Hill have remained.

Yebisu Garden Place was founded in 1994 as a redevelopment project on the former site of a beer brewery. It is a popular spot consisting of a wide variety of facilities such as the Ebisu Mitsukoshi Department Store, Tokyo Metropolitan Museum of Photography, Westin Hotel Tokyo, restaurants, and the Museum of Yebisu Beer.

Following its opening, many restaurants, cafes, and boutiques began to converge there, making Ebisu one of Tokyo's major cities for enjoying gourmet food and fashion.



Daikanyama A Town Where Style and Lush Greenery Coexist

This popular city is often highly ranked as one of the most desirable places to live. It spans the area from around Tokyu Toyoko Line Daikanyama Station to the Old Yamate-dori and Hachiman-dori. Along these streets are fashionable stores, giving a gleaming impression of the city. They include boutiques, cafes, cake shops, restaurants and Daikanyama T-Site, a facility consisting of Tsutaya Books Daikanyama and a specialty store area located in a site of 4,000-*tsubo*, where rich greenery still remains. An added appeal of this area is the convenient location only a little over a 10-minute walk to Shibuya, Ebisu, and Nakameguro.

Tsutaya Books Daikanyama

A store filled with culture and items that help enjoy life more deeply found on the music floor with an extensive collection of jazz, classical, rock, and pop, a movie floor with a large collection including masterpieces and movies that have not been made to DVD, a stationery section with an array of pens from all over the world, the Anjin lounge, which is surrounded by valuable art books, magazines, and art, the Book & Café Starbucks, a Family Mart with a higher than usual level of goods, and a travel counter where travel arrangements can be made.
